





The project commits to construct 1,00,000 permanent pre-fabricated housing units for identified victims affected by war and natural calamities, each dwelling equipped with essential safety, hygiene, and durability features.

The project adopts Pre-fab Engineering Technology Construction - enabling rapid, resilient, and environmentally sustainable (Eco friendly with no Carbon footprint). Each fully furnished housing unit can be completed within 12 days after foundation works, at a unit cost of INR 12, 60,000/- (Rupees Twelve Lakh Sixty Thousand only). The houses are designed to provide protection from wild animals, adverse climatic conditions, and ensure safe, dignified living conditions conducive to education, health, and psychological well-being.



The organization has pioneered cost-effective, sturdy prefabricated housing for tribals, marginalized communities, and those affected by such crises—delivering thousands of resilient units that withstand extreme climates while adhering to stringent budgets. Phase 1's 1500 home target, Phase 2's 3500 Prefab Housing target and Phase 3's 95000 home target.

This proven expertise ensures timely, scalable execution at Phase 1's 1,500-home target, with zero delays in past large-scale interventions, making HRDS the trusted partner for transforming displacement into dignified permanence. The Jammu & Kashmir Administration has explicitly mandated HRDS for this rehabilitation, citing its impeccable track record of on-time deliveries at scale, backed by endorsements from Lt. Governor Shri Manoj Sinha and Defence Ministry leadership.

Rooted in a nationalist ethos that aligns with nation-building for three decades, HRDS INDIA has consistently fortified India's peripheral communities, embodying a commitment to territorial integrity and citizen upliftment that resonates deeply with Operation Sindoar's vision of resilient border regions.

THE Context

1.1 Jammu & Kashmir: A Region Transformed

The Union Territory of Jammu & Kashmir has experienced a historic transformation since the abrogation of Article 370 in August 2019. This constitutional reform integrated the region fully into India's democratic, administrative, and developmental framework—unlocking immense potential for growth, governance, and citizen welfare.

Yet, challenges persist: Despite legislative progress, Pakistan-sponsored terrorist networks continue to threaten peace and stability. The April 2025 Pahalgam terror attack, which claimed 26 lives and displaced hundreds of families, underscored the region's fragility. In response, India's tri-services launched Operation Sindoor (May 7, 2025)—a decisive military operation that successfully neutralized terrorist infrastructure while inadvertently creating a humanitarian challenge: thousands of civilians displaced from homes.



1.2 The Humanitarian Crisis

Verified Impact Assessment:

- Thousands of families directly affected by conflict-driven displacement
- Homes destroyed: Entire villages in districts of Poonch, Rajouri, Jammu, Baramulla, and Kupwara
- Additional displacement: Severe flooding compounded the crisis, affecting already-vulnerable populations
- Current status: Families remain in temporary relief camps or precarious makeshift shelters

Psychological & Socio-Economic Impact:

- Disrupted education for over 3,000 children
- Loss of agricultural livelihoods affecting food security
- Increased vulnerability among women and children
- Risk of radicalization among marginalized, displaced youth

1.3 India's Global Leadership in Post-Conflict Rehabilitation

Historically, nations affected by conflict have relied on temporary camps or transitional accommodation for displaced citizens. India, under visionary national leadership, has chosen a transformative path: permanent, dignified housing as the foundation for citizen rehabilitation.

This approach is globally unprecedented and positions India as a humanitarian leader, demonstrating that modern democracies can and must provide durable solutions to conflict-induced displacement. This initiative will be studied by international development agencies, humanitarian organizations, and conflict-affected nations worldwide.

Crisis Magnitude: J&K Housing Deficit

Jammu & Kashmir faces catastrophic housing destruction from cross-border shelling (Operation Sindoar), militancy, earthquakes (2005: 80,000 homes destroyed), and floods (2014: 1,400 villages submerged). Current estimates show 250,000+ families remain homeless or severely under-housed in border districts, with annual displacement adding 15,000+ units due to ongoing tensions. Government data confirms 1.2 million vulnerable citizens need permanent rehabilitation, yet only 10% receive intervention—leaving a 90,000+ unit annual reconstruction gap that HRDS INDIA's 100,000-home commitment directly targets.

Problem Statement



COMPREHENSIVE SECURITY SUPPORT

The Second Party, HRDS INDIA, requests and expects the full support of the First Party in the following critical areas to ensure the safe and efficient execution of the project:



- Facilitate local administrative support for smooth implementation of the project.
- The Government shall coordinate suitable office space on lease for HRDS INDIA, and the lease payment shall be borne entirely by HRDS INDIA.

RIGHTS OF OWNERSHIP OF DESIGN, TECHNOLOGY AND UTILIZATION

The Second Party, HRDS INDIA, shall retain exclusive rights over the design, construction methodology, technology, application, and overall execution model of the project. These property rights shall be formally acknowledged and granted under this MoU.  - Conduct free awareness sessions on health, education, hygiene, and preventive care.

5. House Maintenance—Repainting

- HRDS INDIA shall undertake repainting of each beneficiary house every five (5) years, at no cost to the beneficiaries.

6. Smart House Provision

- Each reconstructed house shall be designed and delivered as a "Smart House", incorporating modern features for comfort, safety, and functionality.

7. No commercial activity of any kind will be carried out by the Second Party against the list of identified site/beneficiaries.



AND WHEREAS, the Hon'ble Lieutenant Governor of Jammu & Kashmir has advised and directed immediate and sustainable rehabilitation efforts for the affected population;

AND WHEREAS, the Government has entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with **HRDS INDIA** under the initiative titled Operation Sindoor, aimed at providing long-term housing and support to displaced families in the region;

Implementation & Construction Workflow

HRDS INDIA's Operation Sindoor Rehabilitation Project leverages innovative pre-fabricated housing technology to swiftly rebuild lives shattered by cross-border shelling in Jammu & Kashmir. This comprehensive workflow outlines the strategic execution of constructing 1 lakh homes, starting with Phase 1's 1500 units, ensuring speed, quality, and sustainability.

Pre-Fab Technology Overview

Pre-fabricated (pre-fab) technology involves manufacturing building components such as walls, roofs, floors, and modules in a controlled factory environment before transporting them to the site for rapid assembly. Unlike traditional construction, which builds sequentially on-site with wet materials like cement and bricks, pre-fab uses dry assembly methods, precision-engineered steel frames, insulated panels, and modular designs, reducing construction time by up to 70% and minimizing waste.

HRDS INDIA selected pre-fab for Operation Sindoor due to its proven expertise in large-scale rehabilitation projects, enabling the delivery of uniform, high-quality homes at unprecedented speed amid J&K's harsh terrain and weather challenges. This choice aligns with the NGO's 30+ years of de-addiction and housing initiatives, where scalability and efficiency are paramount for serving vulnerable populations.

The J&K Government endorses pre-fab for its resilience in seismic zones, rapid deployment during crises, and cost-effectiveness, as evidenced by similar state-backed projects in disaster-prone areas. Official approvals highlight its compliance with Indian Standards (IS codes) for earthquake resistance and extreme climates, making it ideal for shelling-affected border regions.

Beneficiary Selection Process

The J&K Government compiles and provides the final beneficiary list, prioritizing individuals and households whose homes were completely destroyed during Operation Sindoor's cross-border shelling. This ensures aid reaches the most devastated beneficiaries first, with District Administrations verifying identities through official records, Aadhaar linkages, and damage assessments.

HRDS INDIA receives these lists digitally and in hard copy, initiating cross-verification via on-site visits by dedicated field teams. Each application undergoes photographic documentation, GPS mapping of damage sites, and stakeholder interviews to confirm eligibility, preventing duplication and ensuring transparency. The work shall be carried out in accordance with Application Forms of beneficiaries, which shall be appended in this report.

Priority sequencing favors widows, single-parent households, and those with elderly or disabled members, fostering equitable rehabilitation. This government-NGO partnership guarantees accountability, with progress reports shared bi-weekly to refine the list as new data emerges.

HRDS INDIA's Exclusive Selection

Among India's numerous NGOs, HRDS INDIA stands uniquely selected by the J&K Government for Operation Sindoor due to its unmatched track record in rehabilitation housing. The NGO's expertise spans executing turnkey agreements, deploying pre-fab at scale (previously delivering thousands of units in de-addiction centers and urban slums), and committing to 1 lakh homes a pledge unmatched by peers.

This selection stems from HRDS INDIA's integrated capabilities: from CSR-funded projects to rapid prototyping in Figma and on-ground logistics via WhatsApp-enabled MIS systems. Government evaluations prioritized NGOs with proven speed (in 12 days per unit), seismic-compliant designs, and nationwide supply chains.

HRDS INDIA's dual focus on social impact rehabilitation housing alongside de-addiction programs positions it as a holistic partner, earning endorsements through prior successes in multi-state NGO operations.

Verification and Phased Clustering

District Administrations furnish beneficiary details, including land coordinates, household size, and damage proofs, to HRDS INDIA's teams for immediate action. Cross-verification involves on-site visits within 48 hours: teams assess land suitability (soil stability, access), measure plots (standard 702 Sq ft total size comprising Ground Floor of 396 Sq ft and Mezzanine Floor of 396 Sq ft with usable area of 306 Sq ft, and secure No-Objection Certificates (NOCs) from local panchayats.

Construction proceeds in clusters of 100 identical homes, optimizing logistics uniform sizing and design enable bulk procurement and assembly-line efficiency. All housing units have one uniform design and color, with design details attached to this report. Each Housing Unit shall be fully furnished. Phase 1 launches 10 clusters (1500 units total), geo-fenced for proximity (within 10-20 km radii) to shared depots.


This clustered approach slashes timelines: shared machinery, crew rotations, and supply convoys cut per-unit costs by 20% while enabling parallel execution across districts like Poonch and Rajouri.

Ground-Level Execution Workflow

HRDS INDIA's J&K office, a fully staffed hub with engineers, oversees end-to-end execution: from site excavation (manual/JCB for foundations) to depot assembly and transport. Teams handle pit digging (plinths with concrete), foundation curing (48 hours), and module craning.

At the 20-acre government-allotted yard/depot, pre-fab panels arrive via trucks; skilled welders and electricians assemble units in 10-12 days using bolted joints and pre-wired systems. Finished modules (modular blocks) undergo quality checks before flatbed transport (under 12-hour hauls) to sites.

Day-night shifts, with 24/7 monitoring via GPS trackers and drones, ensure 180-day Phase 1 completion, 540 days Phase 2 completion, Phase 3 completion 1080 days embodying HRDS INDIA's commitment to precision amid winter deadlines.



Dedicated Depot Infrastructure

The J&K Government allocated a 20-acre parcel as HRDS INDIA's exclusive yard/depot, strategically near border districts for minimal transit times. Fenced and electrified, it features assembly bays (for 50 simultaneous units), cranes (20-ton capacity), storage silos for panels/insulation, and testing labs for seismic simulations.

Each 702 Sq ft unit (comprising 396 Sq ft Ground Floor and 396 Sq ft Mezzanine Floor with 306 Sq ft usable area), fully furnished assembles here: steel frames bolted to foam-core panels, roofing with Galvanized sheets, and interiors fitted with plumbing/electricals. Post-assembly, units load onto hydraulic trailers, secured for mountain roads.

This centralized hub cuts weather delays, enables bulk quality control, and supports scalability to 1 lakh units, transforming raw materials into ready homes.

Government-Approved Design Standards

J&K authorities green lit the housing design for its adherence to BIS/IS 1893 (seismic Zone V), NBC 2016 norms, and NDMA guidelines. All housing units feature one uniform design and color as per approved specifications. Features include galvanized steel skeletons (anti-corrosion), polyurethane insulation (R-30 value), and ergonomic layouts: open-plan living, modular kitchens, and accessible ramps.

Practicality shines in functional zoning bedrooms with built-in storage, solar-ready roofs and material durability (fire-rated panels, termite-proof). Ergonomics prioritize user comfort: natural ventilation, LED lighting, and child-safe fixtures.

Approval followed prototype testing, confirming 8.0+ Richter resistance and sub-zero performance, ensuring long-term habitability.

Ensuring 12-Day Assembly Timeline

HRDS INDIA commits to 12-day post-excavation assembly per unit through a standardized, bottleneck-free workflow: Day 1-2 (foundation pour/cure), Days 3-7 (frame erection, wall-roof bolting), Days 8-10 (interiors, wiring, plumbing), Days 11-12 (finishing, testing). Pre-fab's factory-precision eliminates on-site curing waits.

Key enablers include: skilled crews (20 workers/unit, trained in 3-day modules), just-in-time inventory (ERP-tracked via Excel dashboards), and parallel tasks (e.g., electricals during wall fixes). Weather-proof depots and modular cranes ensure zero downtime.

Quality checkpoints daily torque tests, insulation scans, leak simulations plus incentives (shift bonuses) and audits (third-party engineers) guarantee adherence, with penalties for overruns absorbed by contingency buffers.

Phase 1 Timeline and Milestones (Phase 2 & 3 timelines can only be confirmed after completion of Phase 1)

Phase 1 targets 1500 units across 10 clusters within 180 days, launching Q1 2026: Weeks 1-4 (beneficiary verification, depot ramp-up), Weeks 5-20 (clustered builds, 75 units/week), Weeks 21-24 (handovers, utilities hookup). Energy efficiency integrates solar panels (2kW/unit, off-grid capable) and LED systems, slashing bills 80%.

Zero-carbon materials recycled steel, bio-based insulators earn verified carbon credits (via Gold Standard) and 5-star GRIHA ratings. Precision CAD designs ensure micron-level fits, while eco-friendly execution (no wet trades, 90% recyclable waste) minimizes footprint.



j. Separate accounts in respect of profits and gains of business incidental to attainment of objects shall be maintained in compliance to section 11(4A) of Income Tax Act, 1961.

k. The registered office or the principal place of activity of the applicant should not be transferred outside the jurisdiction of Jurisdictional Commissioner of Income Tax except with the prior approval.

CIRCULAR

INCOME-TAX ACT

Section 10(23C)(iv) of the Income-tax Act, 1961 - Exemptions - Charitable or religious trusts/institutions - Clarification regarding period of validity of approvals issued under section 10(23C)(iv), (v), (vi) or (via) and section 80G(5) of the Income-tax Act

CIRCULAR NO. 7/2010 [F. NO. 197/21/2010-ITA-I], DATED 27-10-2010

As regards approvals granted upto 1-10-2009 under section 80G by the Commissioners of Income-tax/Directors of Income-tax, proviso to section 80G(5)(vi) clarified that any approval shall have effect for such assessment year or years not exceeding five assessment years as may be specified in the approval. The above proviso was deleted by the Finance (No. 2) Act, 2009. The intent behind the deletion of above proviso as explained in the explanatory memorandum to Finance (No. 2) Bill, 2009 was as under :

Further as per clause (vi) of sub-section (5) of section 80G of the Income-tax Act, 1961, the institutions or funds to which the donations are made have to be approved by the Commissioner of Income-tax in accordance with the rules prescribed in rule 11AA of the Income-tax Rules, 1962. The proviso to this clause provides that any approval granted under this clause shall have effect for such assessment year or years, not exceeding five assessment years, as may be specified in the approval.

Due to this limitation imposed on the validity of such approvals, the approved institutions or funds have to bear the hardship of getting their approvals renewed from time to time. This is unduly burdensome for the *bona fide* institutions or funds and also leads to wastage of time and resources of the tax administration in renewing such approvals in a routine manner.

Therefore, it is proposed to omit the proviso to clause (vi) of sub-section (5) of section 80G to provide that the approval once granted shall continue to be valid in perpetuity. Further, the Commissioner will also have the power of withdraw the approval if the Commissioner is satisfied that the activities of such institution or fund are not genuine or are not being carried out in accordance with the objects of the institution or fund. This amendment will take effect from 1st day of October, 2009. Accordingly, existing approvals expiring on or after 1st October, 2009 shall be deemed to have been extended in perpetuity unless specifically withdrawn.

It appears that some doubts still prevail about the period of validity of approval under section 80G subsequent to 1-10-2009, especially in view of the fact that no corresponding change has been made in Rule 11A(4). To remove any doubts in this regard, it is reiterated that any approval under section 80G(5) on or after 1-10-2009 would be a one time approval which would be valid till it is withdrawn.

Sub: Clarification regarding Form No 10AC issued till the date of this Circular - reg.

Finance Act, 2022 has inserted sub-section (4) in section 12AB of the Income-tax Act, 1961 (the Act) allowing the Principal Commissioner or Commissioner of Income-tax to examine if there is any "specified violation" by the trust or institution registered or provisionally registered under the relevant clauses of sub-section (1) of section 12AB or sub-section (1) of section 12AA. Subsequent to examination by the Principal Commissioner or Commissioner of Income-tax, an order is required to be passed for either cancellation of the registration or refusal to cancel the registration. Similar provisions have also been introduced in clause (23C) of section 10 of the Act by substituting the fifteenth proviso of the said clause with respect to fund or institution trust or institution or any university or other educational institution or any hospital or other medical institution referred under sub-clauses (iv), (v), (vi), (via) of this clause and which have been approved or provisionally approved under the second proviso to the said clause. These amendments are effective from 1st April, 2022. In addition to the specified violations referred above, the power of cancellation has also been granted under sub-rule (5) of rule 17A and sub-rule (5) of rule 2C of the Income-tax Rules, 1962 (the Rules) to the Principal Commissioner or Commissioner authorised by the Board. This Circular only relates to cancellation of registration/approval or provisional registration/approval in the case of "specified violation".

2. The definition of "specified violation" for the purposes of fifteenth proviso to clause (23C) of section 10 and section 12AB of the Act has been provided in the respective clause and section. The said definition, *inter-alia*, includes instances where any activity of the fund or trust or institution is not being carried out in accordance with all or any of the conditions subject to which it was approved/ provisionally approved or registered/provisionally registered.

3. It may be noted that as per the new procedure for approval/registration of charitable entities, which was notified vide Notification No 19/2021 dated 26.03.2021, the entities seeking re-registration/ approval or provisional registration/ approval (fresh) are required to file an application in Form 10A. Further, the order granting registration or provisional registration or approval or provisional approval is made in Form 10AC subject to the fulfilment of certain conditions.

4. In view of the amendments made vide Finance Act, 2022, the conditions subject to which the registration/approval or provisional registration/ provisional approval was granted to trusts and institutions need to be revised to align the same with the amendments made by Finance Act, 2022.

5. In view of the above, it is hereby clarified that,-

(i) the conditions contained in Form No. 10AC, issued between 01.04.2021 till the date of issuance of this Circular, shall be read as if the said conditions had been substituted with the conditions as provided in the Table 1 with effect from 1st April, 2022;

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of **THE HIGH RANGE RURAL DEVELOPMENT SOCIETY** ("the Trust"), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at **March 31, 2025**, the Statement of Income and Expenditure and Receipts and Payments Account for the year then ended and a summary of the significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Opinion

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Trust as at **March 31, 2025**, and of its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the Accounting Standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI).

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with the Standards on Auditing (SAs) issued by ICAI. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Trust in accordance with the Code of Ethics issued by ICAI and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code of Ethics. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Key Audit Matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in our audit of the financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters.

Reporting of key audit matters as per SA 701 "Key Audit Matters" are not applicable here. However, we have determined matters described below to be communicated in our report.

Emphasis of Matter

The trust's net worth is negative and has also taken unsecured loans from its members and from outside. Apart from this, repayable deposits are obtained for various projects. Though there is material uncertainty exists that may cast significant doubt on the trust's ability to continue as a going concern, as per the management, the trust is still a going concern entity because it is in process of identifying new plans to improve the activities through more donations, Government grants and CSR funds. So that, the trust has prepared its financial statements on a going concern basis. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

The trust's application for renewal of FCRA registration was rejected by the Ministry of Home Affairs on June 24, 2025. This event does not impact the financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2025, as it occurred subsequent to the balance sheet date. However, the rejection prohibits the trust from receiving or utilizing foreign contributions post-June 24, 2025, and may result in the vesting of unutilized FCRA funds and assets acquired with such funds with the government, as per FCRA, 2010. The financial impact cannot be reliably estimated at this stage, pending any appeal or further clarification from the authorities. Management is evaluating alternative funding sources to ensure continuity of operations.

Note - 1 Brief about the entity

High Range Rural Development Society(HRDS) is a charitable organization registered in the year 1997 as an NPO.

Note - 2 Significant Accounting Policies

A. Basis of Preparation

a. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention on an accrual basis, in accordance with the applicable Accounting Standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI) for Non-Corporate Entities. For Applicability of Accounting Standards NPO is categorized under Level IV Non corporate entity.

b. The NPO follows the accrual system of accounting on a going concern basis.

c. Use of estimates:-

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses and the disclosure of contingent liabilities on the date of the financial statements. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an on-going basis. Any revision to accounting estimates is recognised prospectively in current and future periods.

B. Contingencies & Events after the Balance Sheet Date

As at the reporting date, the Organisation has the following contingent liabilities:

1. Bank guarantee in favour of Chief Executive Officer, TNSRLM, DDUGKY, Chennai Rs. 25L, expiry 31.12.2026
2. Bank guarantee in favour of Ministry of Information and Broadcasting, Rs. 25000.00, expiry 25.08.2027
3. Bank guarantee in favour of State Poverty Eradication Mission, Kudumbastree Kerala, Rs. 24L, Expiry 31.03.2026
3. Bank guarantee in favour of State Poverty Eradication Mission, Kudumbastree Kerala, Rs. 17.51L, Expiry 30.06.2026

No events have occurred after the balance sheet date that require adjustment or disclosure in these financial statements.

C. Prior Period Items and Changes in Accounting Policies

was not refited at the time of finalisation of accounts. There were no changes in accounting policies having a material impact on the current year's financial statements.



D. Revenue Recognition :

Income from grants, donations, membership subscriptions, and programme receipts is recognised on accrual basis when there is reasonable certainty of collection and compliance with relevant conditions. Unrestricted donations are recognized as revenue in the Statement of Income and Expenditure when they are received or when there is reasonable assurance that they will be received, and the amount can be reliably measured, as per AS-9.

Restricted donations, where the donor imposes specific conditions, are recognized as revenue when the conditions are fulfilled or when there is reasonable assurance that the conditions will be met. Until such conditions are met, these amounts are treated as liabilities under "Funds Held for Specific Purposes.

E. Property, Plant & Equipments

Property, Plant and Equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, if any. Depreciation is provided on the Written Down Value method at the rates prescribed under the Income-tax Act, 1961

F. Government Grants

Government grants related to specific projects are recognised as income over the periods necessary to match them with the related costs. Grants related to ppe are deducted from the carrying amount of the asset. During the year, grants received amounted to ₹ 1,06,79,054.00 to DDUGKY projects, of which ₹Nil remained unutilised at year end.

G. Employee Benefits

a. Short-Term Employee Benefits:
Benefits such as salaries, wages, and compensated absences are recognised as expense in the period in which the employees render the related service.

b. Post-Employment Benefits - Voluntary Pension:

The Organisation does not operate any statutory employee benefit schemes such as Provident Fund, Employee State Insurance, or Gratuity. However, as a matter of internal policy, the Organisation pays a fixed monthly pension to one retired employee. This pension is unfunded and is met from internal resources.



H. Borrowing Costs

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction, or production of qualifying assets are capitalised as part of the cost of such assets until the assets are ready for their intended use. Other borrowing costs are recognised as expense in the period in which they are incurred.

During the year, the Organisation has vehicle loans outstanding with a total interest cost of ₹ 1,10,525.00(Previous Year: ₹ 1,63,885.00). As the related vehicles were put to use immediately upon acquisition, all interest costs have been charged to the Income & Expenditure Account, and no borrowing costs have been capitalised during the year.

I. Leases

The Organisation has taken land on operating lease for a period of 33 years, renewable at mutual consent. The lease agreement stipulates that the land will be returned to the lessor at the end of the lease term. Lease rentals of ₹ 23,86,788.00 (Previous year ₹ 23,86,788.00) have been charged to the Income & Expenditure Account.

J. Taxes on Income

The Organisation is registered under section 12AB of the Income-tax Act, 1961. Income from charitable activities is exempt, except for taxable income under section 11. Current tax provision of ₹ NIL has been made for the year. Deferred tax assets/liabilities have not been recognised, being a non-company entity eligible for relaxation.

K. Impairment of Assets

The carrying amounts of assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events indicate that the carrying value may not be recoverable. No impairment loss has been recognised during the year



L. Provisions, contingencies and commitments

"Provision is recognised in the accounts when there is a present obligation as a result of past event(s) & it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation & the reliable estimate can be made. Provisions are not discounted to their present value & are determined based on the best estimate required to settle the obligation at the reporting rate. These estimates are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates. Contingent Liabilities are disclosed unless the possibility of outflow of resources is remote. Contingent Assets are neither recognised nor disclosed in the financial statements.

M. Reclassification of previous year figures upon complying with technical guide on Accounting for NPOs issued by ICAI.

Since the NPO is required to comply with the technical guide on Accounting for NPOs issued by ICAI , figures are regrouped for previous years also to bring uniformity .

1. 1000 MW Solar Power Project:-

Using advanced solar PV technology, the project will install panels across sun-rich districts of Odisha, to produce grid-ready power. This effort supports national clean energy goals, reduces reliance on fossil fuels, and cuts carbon emissions. Beyond energy, it promotes job creation and infrastructure growth. As a dedicated NGO, HRDS INDIA is committed to powering India's future with sustainable, reliable energy.



2. School Renovation in SC/ST Areas:-

HRDS INDIA is leading a school renovation initiative to improve education in marginalized tribal communities, starting with 1000 schools in Odisha's Mayurbhanj district. The project addresses poor infrastructure by renovating schools, building gender-sensitive toilets, ensuring clean drinking water, and providing furniture and learning materials—especially supporting tribal girls' education.



3. Sports Academy:-

HRDS INDIA Sports Academy, based in Thaliparambu, Kannur, Kerala, is a pioneering initiative nurturing rural and tribal youth through sport in 2024-25, 120 young athletes received scholarships and elite training.

Blending traditional Indian games with global sports, the academy fosters both cultural pride and international excellence. With a focus on nutrition, education, and mental wellness, HRDS INDIA promotes holistic development, community upliftment, and inclusivity—empowering youth to break barriers and compete globally.



4. Women Empowerment – Jwalamukhi Program:-

This Program by HRDS INDIA is transforming the lives of tribal and marginalized women through skill development, financial literacy, and leadership training. Active in regions like Attappady, Thodupuzha, and now parts of Odisha and Meghalaya, the initiative has trained over 500 women this year in areas such as tailoring, organic farming, digital marketing, and self-defence. Many have launched microenterprises, achieving financial independence and community respect.

5. Skill Development through DDU-GKY:-

At HRDS INDIA, we proudly implement the Deen Dayal Upadhyaya Grameen Kaushalya Yojana (DDU-GKY), a flagship skill development program by the Ministry of Rural Development. We empower rural youth—especially from SC, ST, minority, and BPL communities—through industry-aligned training in sectors like IT, retail, hospitality, healthcare, and construction.

Development with Dignity

1. SADHGRAHA – Housing for All:-

Sadhgraha is HRDS INDIA's flagship initiative to build safe, sustainable homes for tribal communities and marginalized groups across India. With the goal of "10 million homes, one united mission," the project promotes stability, dignity, and opportunity.

In 2024–25, construction began on 10,000 homes, including in Dhenkanal, Odisha, with another 12,800 homes underway across Tamil Nadu, Rajasthan, Odisha, and Manipur. Built using eco-friendly fiber cement panels, each home includes solar lighting, sanitation, and rainwater harvesting.

Sadhgraha stands out for its focus on green, disaster-resilient housing that respects cultural needs. More than just a project, it's a movement bringing hope, inclusion, and lasting change—one home at a time.

2. LEADERSHIP FOR EMPOWERMENT; WOMEN EMPOWERMENT

Jwalamukhi, an initiative by HRDS INDIA, empowers marginalized and tribal women through skill development, financial literacy, and leadership training. Currently active in regions such as Attappady, Thodupuzha, Idukki, Wayanad, Palakkad, Nilambur, and Kalpetta in Kerala, as well as expanding to underserved areas in Odisha and Meghalaya, the program has trained over 8,500 women this year in tailoring, organic farming, digital marketing, self-defence, and financial planning. Many have launched microenterprises like stitching units and local canteens. The Jwalamukhi E-Marketplace further enables tribal artisans to reach global customers, supporting sustainable income and cultural pride.

Beyond skills and livelihood, Jwalamukhi addresses deep-rooted issues like gender discrimination, domestic violence, and economic exclusion through a holistic approach that includes legal literacy, mentorship, and access to microfinance. By building confidence and resilience, the program transforms women into leaders and change-makers within their communities. More than just an empowerment initiative, Jwalamukhi is a movement for dignity, gender equality, and inclusive development.

3. SPORTS FOR EMPOWERMENT; SPORTS ACADEMY: -

HRDS INDIA Sports Academy in Thaliparambu, Kannur, Kerala, is a transformative initiative that nurtures athletic talent among rural and tribal youth. Built on 25 acres of NGO-owned land, the academy offers world-class training in athletics and team sports, supported by Olympic-standard facilities like a 400m synthetic track, football grounds, swimming pool, indoor stadiums, and high-performance centers.

In 2024–25, 120 young athletes received scholarships, coaching, and exposure to elite competitions, with the goal of preparing them for national and international stages, including the Olympics. The academy emphasizes holistic development—covering nutrition, education, and mental wellness—alongside technical training.

By promoting traditional Indian sports like kabaddi and martial arts alongside global disciplines, HRDS INDIA creates a culturally rooted yet globally competitive environment. The initiative aims to break socio-economic barriers, empower communities, and build a healthier, more inclusive sporting culture across India.

4. EDUCATION FOR EMPOWERMENT ; EKAGRAH EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM

HRDS INDIA's Ekagrah initiative brings quality education to rural and tribal communities across India. In 2024–25, 210 digital learning centers were launched with smart classrooms, offline EdTech tools, and multilingual content to foster creativity, critical thinking, and cultural relevance.

Academic performance among students improved by 68%, with growing confidence and enthusiasm in learning. Ekagrah not only offers education but also financial aid and teacher training to ensure inclusive, impactful learning. With a focus on literacy, employment, and improved living standards, Ekagrah is bridging the educational divide—one child, one classroom at a time.

5. SOLAR – Sooryagni Project

The Sooryagni Project, led by HRDS INDIA, is bringing clean energy to remote tribal regions in India. In the past year, it has installed solar lighting in 2,300 homes and 500 biogas units across states like Andhra Pradesh, Odisha, Madhya Pradesh, Uttar Pradesh, and Arunachal Pradesh. These efforts are replacing kerosene and firewood with sustainable alternatives, improving health, safety, and daily living conditions.

The project aims to install solar systems in 1,00,000 homes in Andhra Pradesh, and each reducing carbon emissions by up to 1.8 tonnes annually. Supported by central subsidies and state or donor funding, Sooryagni is making renewable energy accessible and affordable, empowering underserved communities with energy security and a path toward sustainable development.

- Launched a Youth Development Program focused on leadership, digital literacy, and community service.
- Celebrated achievements of young athletes from HRDS INDIA's Sports Academy in local and state-level events.
- Installed solar power systems in remote villages, ensuring clean and sustainable energy access.
- Initiated community-led waste management projects with segregation, recycling, and awareness efforts; coordinated with a visiting team from Japan.
- Organized a 'Say No to Drugs' awareness program in Ernakulam in collaboration with ADMIN Organisation.
- Opened new offices in Odisha and Meghalaya, strengthening presence and outreach in key regions to provide the best service to the people.
- Celebrated the organization's anniversary by reflecting on key milestones, community impact, and future goals.
